Pacific Cancer Foundation Cancer Patient Nutrition Program ~ Grant Request 2022

A. PROFILE

The Pacific Cancer Foundation (PCF) is seeking a \$25,000 grant for the support of our nutritional support program. This program is vital to the patient's successful outcomes and long-term survival rates.

B. STATEMENT OF NEED

Maui County consists of 3 rural and remote islands in the Hawaiian island chain, Maui, Molokai and Lanai. We do not have a cancer center in Maui County as found in most urban areas. Instead, our cancer patients are considered "out-patients" and are not eligible for "in-patient" hospital services such as nutritional support by a registered dietician.

Nutrition therapy is used to help cancer patients keep a healthy body weight, maintain strength, keep body tissue healthy, and decrease side effects both during and after treatment.

For many patients, the effects of cancer and cancer treatments make it hard to eat as well. Cancer treatments that affect nutrition include:

- Chemotherapy Chemotherapy uses drugs to stop the growth of cancer cells, either by killing the cells or by stopping them from dividing. Healthy cells that normally grow and divide quickly may also be killed. These include cells in the mouth and digestive tract.
- Hormone therapy may be used to slow or stop the growth of certain cancers. Some types of hormone therapy may cause weight gain.
- Radiation therapy has side effects that cause nutrition problems. Most of the side
 effects begin two to three weeks after radiation therapy begins and go away a few
 weeks after it is finished. Some side effects can continue for months or years after
 treatment ends.
- Surgery The body needs extra energy and nutrients to heal wounds, fight infection, and recover from surgery
- Immunotherapy Side effects from Immunotherapy cause tiredness, fever, nausea, vomiting and diarrhea.

Monitoring nutrient intake, along with weight loss and gain it critical to a patients recovery.

C. SCOPE OF THE PROJECT

A registered dietician is a part of the team of health professional that help with cancer treatment and recovery. Our registered dietician works with patients, their families, and the rest of the medical team to manage the patient's diet during and after cancer treatment. PCF provides nutritional support services to all three islands in Maui County. Patients on the outer islands are provided these services through our telehealth program.

The 2022 project scope will include:

- Support with funding for our registered dietician
- Support with funding for UpDox (telehealth software)
- Nutritional supplements PCF purchases Ensure, Glucerna and Kate Farms nutritional supplements. Supplements come in a variety of flavors and a varying degree of nutritional content (i.e. less sugars for diabetics, different levels of protein, an organic variety). Patients are given 1 case of supplement each month as needed. Supplements are provided to Maui Memorial Medical center infusion patients and Pacific Cancer Institute radiation patients. Supplements are delivered directly to Molokai General Hospital. PCF ships supplements via the ferry to Lanai patients.
- Provide nutritional education materials
- Offer nutrition workshops (as COVID protocol permits)

Nutrition Program Objectives:

- Provide nutritional assessment and management
- Provide counseling and diet changes to improve patient health
- Provide nutrition therapy for patients with advanced cancers
- Provide education to family with a child in treatment
- Provide community education through workshops on nutrition and cancer prevention

D. Client Demographic/Individuals Served

Hawaii is one of the most racially diverse places in the world as there is no majority everyone is in a minority. According to the Census, 23.6% of Hawaii residents claimed multi-ethnic backgrounds (two or more races), far more than any other state in the US. We have a "mixed plate" of ethnic groups in Hawaii; 38.6% of Hawaii's population is Asian, 24.7% is White, 10% is Native Hawaiian or other Pacific Islanders, 8.9% is Hispanic, 1.6% is Black or African American, and 0.3% is American Indian and Alaska Native.

Individuals Served in 2021 buy The Foundation's nutrition program include:

- 246 nutritional consults county wide
- 186 cases of nutritional supplements provided

- 246 nutritional consults county wide
- 186 cases of nutritional supplements provided
- 48% Male and 52% Female
- 37% of our client are White, 33% Asian, 28% Hawaiian/South Pacific Islanders and 2% Hispanic
- The nutritional support program if crucial to the island of Molokai as their residents would otherwise be unable to seek any type of nutritional guidance or supplements.

E. Making A Difference

Each year the Laurence H. Dorcy Foundation grant makes a big impact in our cancer community here in Maui County. Having a long-term partner in the fight against cancer is critical to our organization.

PCF would like to utilize the grant proceeds to support our Nutritional support program. Nutritional support can improve a patient's quality of life during and after cancer treatment.

In 2019, prior to COVID, PCF hosted 18 nutrition workshops. These workshops were extremely popular with attendance averaging 75 people. The workshops were directed towards nutrition as a cancer prevention model, for patients, and for survivors and family member after treatment and beyond. The presentations came from our nutritionist as well as other medical professional who specialized in nutrition. We also combined some of the workshops with other complimentary care offerings such as meditation, yoga, paddling, and art therapy. We look forward to offering these workshops again in 2022 and beyond.

Nutritional support is vital to the needs of our cancer community. PCF's primary focus is to continue to strengthen our existing programs as one of our organization's core values is to fill the "pukas" or holes in our health care system.

Like many non-profits, PCF has been hit hard by the pandemic. Our Board of Directors stepped up to make important financial decisions to help keep our organization strong over the last 2 years. We cut admin expenses and put all our focus into our most important programs. Our goal will always be to serve the needs of our cancer patients. The challenges they face far outweigh the challenges we have faced during the pandemic.
