Dear Ms. Cownie,

Hawaii Foodbank works to ensure that everyone in our ohana (family) has the food they need to need for healthy, thriving lives. Our mission statement reads: "The people of Hawaii are one ohana. Hawaii Foodbank provides food so that no one in our family goes hungry. We work to gather food and support from our communities. We then distribute food through charitable agencies to those in need. Our mission is from the heart, and we will fulfill our mission with integrity, humanity, and aloha."

The generosity of our community partners, donors, local businesses, volunteers, and countless others has made it possible for Hawaii Foodbank to continue serving the now 1 in 6 Hawaii residents, including 82,000 children, facing food insecurity. In support of this work, Hawaii Foodbank respectfully requests \$25,000 from the Laurence H. Dorcy Hawaiian Foundation for general operations.

Since 1983, Hawaii Foodbank and its network of more than 200 charitable partner agencies have distributed food to our communities. In FY2021, we served an average of 166,959 individuals per month, including:

- Our keiki, many from low-income and single-parent families.
- Our **kupuna** who have worked hard their whole lives to put food on the table for their families are now struggling to feed themselves. Many are on fixed incomes from their Social Security and pension checks. With the high cost of living continuing to rise, our parents and grandparents are being faced with having to make the tough choice between buying food or paying for other things like needed medical care or prescriptions.



 The working poor and underemployed who are struggling to pay for housing and basic needs with incomes below federal poverty guidelines. Each month, these individuals and families must make a choice between purchasing food and paying for utilities.

People who are unemployed, houseless, disabled, and/or veterans, as well as victims of domestic violence abuse and those recovering from addiction.

Agencies that distribute Foodbank food directly to the needy include: food pantries, feeding programs, homeless and domestic abuse shelters, residential programs for the elderly and youth at risk, and soup kitchens.











Food Distribution

Hawaii Foodbank has distributed more than 27 million meals since the start of the COVID-19 pandemic, an increase in food distribution of more than 100 percent when compared to prepandemic levels. We purchased more than \$13.2 million in food in FY2021 to meet rising costs and supply chain challenges, in contrast to the typical food purchase annual budget of \$400,000. In FY2022, Hawaii Foodbank anticipates spending \$500,000 per month on food purchase to meet the continued demand.

Food 4 Keiki School & Keiki Pantry Program

Hawaii Foodbank's Food 4 Keiki School & Keiki Pantry programs serves as a critical food resource for young students and their families. The pantries provide students with after-school snacks as well as additional family food bags to take home. Pre-pandemic, the program had expanded to 34 school pantries however mandatory school closures resulted in a temporary pause at several sites. Fortunately, several innovative partners implemented innovative drivethrough and contact-free food pick-ups, along with a food truck, to ensure that students have the food they need. Hawaii Foodbank's long-term goal is to have a school pantry in every Title I school on Oahu and Kauai.

Food 4 Keiki Feeding Our Future

Hawaii Foodbank's Food 4 Keiki Feeding Our Future is a summer lunch program for children at risk of hunger. The program is a partnership between Hawaii Foodbank, The Sodexo Foundation, the University of Hawaii at Manoa, and several Hawaii Foodbank's partner agencies. They prepare hot lunch meals for the participating partner agencies of Hawaii Foodbank to pick-up and distribute to the children.



Ohana Produce Plus Program

Nearly half of the food distributed by Hawaii Foodbank is provided through the Ohana Produce Plus program. This community-based food distribution is regularly scheduled in more than 30 communities on Oahu. For many people, Ohana Produce Plus is their only source of fresh fruits and vegetables. Last year, Hawaii Foodbank distributed more than 10 million pounds of produce and other food, such as cereal, snacks, baked goods,

dairy products, eggs, beverages, and canned goods. We are proud to partner with more than 50 food partner agencies hosting community distribution sites.

Annual Food Drive

Hawaii Foodbank, community partners and official collection sites raised food and funds to provide to feed those in need of food assistance through the Hawaii Foodbank Annual Food Drive. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic and for the safety of our staff, volunteers, long-time partners, and communities that we serve, the Annual Food Drive Day was hosted virtually again last year with online donations, donated food drop-offs at the warehouse and community awareness communications.

Farm to Foodbank Program

Hawaii Foodbank's Farm to Foodbank program was developed in 2020 in partnership with the Hawaii Farm Bureau. Locally grown produce is purchased from Hawaii Farm Bureau farms for distribution to those in need of food assistance, providing nutritious food while contributing to long-term food sustainability in Hawaii. Approximately 25,000 people receive fresh produce each month through our Farm to Foodbank program. Hawaii Foodbank also focuses on distributing culturally relevant, locally grown produce. In many communities served by Hawaii Foodbank, typical foodbank fare such as potatoes and canned vegetables is unfamiliar. By observing and listening to people we serve, we refined our Farm to Foodbank program to include distribution of traditional



fruits and vegetables such as Okinawan sweet potato, choy sum, Shanghai pak choy, long beans, breadfruit, pineapple, taro and poi.

Commitment to Our Mission and Our Community

Hawaii Foodbank serves people of Oahu directly through our Mapunapuna distribution warehouse and serves the people of Kauai through our Kauai branch operations in Lihue. We partner with The Food Basket to serve Hawaii County and with Maui Food Bank to serve Maui County. Together, we work to ensure that no one in our Hawaii ohana goes hungry.

Hawaii Foodbank is certified by Feeding America, a nationwide network of 200 food banks, and holds food safety certifications from AIB International and the State Department of Health. Hawaii Foodbank is the recipient of ten consecutive Charity Navigator 4-Star ratings, exceeding industry standards for financial accountability and transparency.
