The Kauai Independent Food Bank (KIFB) serves the 72,000 residents of the County of Kauai, with a specific focus on keiki and kupuna, our island's most vulnerable demographics. Founded in 1994, our mission is to Educate, Provide Nutritious Food for the Hungry, and Respond to Emergencies. We are proudly in our 27th year of uninterrupted service to the people of Kauai and Ni'ihau.

With a budget of \$1,776,773.00 and 5 full-time staff, we maximize impact by focusing our capacity on programs that allow us to oversee exactly who receives our food. These programs are targeted toward keiki and kupuna because they are the two populations most likely to lack the ability and resources to proactively secure nutrition for themselves. In addition, KIFB maintains strong partnerships with community resilience teams to respond to disasters as they become more frequently occurring. When a very recent landslide in Hanalei on March 12, 2021, cut off the communities from Hanalei to Ha'ena from the rest of the island, KIFB was called on to partner with the Kaua'i Government Employees Federal Credit Union and Kaua'i Fire Department's Ocean Safety Bureau in coordinating a special food delivery that was distributed by KGEFCU from Hale Halawai in Hanalei for families impacted by the landslide and flooding.

KIFB has seen an unprecedented increase in the community's need for access to healthy, nutritious food. From keiki to kupuna, the pandemic has affected every community in the county. The resiliency of our community and local businesses rely on how well recovery is executed. In the beginning months of the COVID-19 pandemic, KIFB sought to both support the local farming and ranching businesses as well as feed the community. This swift response to the growing reports of farmers and ranchers having to cease production both support the economic recovery of vital local businesses and assists those at risk of experiencing food security. KIFB prioritized understanding the impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic over the long haul and assesed the vulnerability of our local food producers. We continue to support these essential businesses and advocate for their crucial work.

We have five major programs, aside from our emergency response including Keiki Café, Backpack Program, Kupuna Program, Uluwehi Program, and the Agency Distribution program.

- 1. The KIFB Keiki Café program supports students' academic enrichment after school by preventing hunger during a time period that many children go hungry. At full capacity, our program provides healthy after-school snacks for approximately 800 keiki each school day. Our program operations reach 8 communities and our services span the island of Kauai.
- 2. The KIFB Backpack Program began in 2005 after staff at our Keiki Café at west Kauai sites observed students "stocking up" with snacks on Friday so that they would have enough food to eat during the weekend. On average, more than 300 children gain access to weekend food through this anonymous backpack service. Backpacks account for the needs of the oldest youth and younger siblings. Over 70% of keiki served through the KIFB Backpack Program identify as Native Hawaiian.
- 3. Through our Kupuna Program and partnerships (Kauai Adult Day Health Care Services, County of Kauai Senior Centers and Alu Like Senior Centers), more than 120 seniors gain access to a health balanced food package each month. Prior to COVID-19, Kupuna would visit our

warehouse to select the foods per food category in a friendly setting. Partnerships with Ka Hale Pono provide food to homebound seniors, and we are expanding our reach to serve more kupuna in the community. We have pivoted this program to completely contact-less delivery to homebound seniors through partnerships with the County of Kauai Agency on Elderly Affairs and the Retired and Senior Volunteer Program (RSVP).

- 4. Uluwehi Emergency Food Distribution allows us to assist people experiencing a food security emergency. Food security emergencies often occur in response to a loss of a job, illness or other misfortune. Food emergency recipients record basic information at the KIFB warehouse and receive a situation-appropriate emergency food box.
- 5. Through our Agency Distribution program, community service agencies gain access to a reliable stock of healthy and appropriate foods. KIFB supplies eighteen food pantries with enough stock to distribute out to community members in need. Direct service programs, such as youth service centers, soup kitchens, senior citizen centers and homeless shelters are all able to expand their community services and improve the food security of their clients due to KIFB Agency Distribution.

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KIFB is humbly requesting \$20,000 in operating support from the Laurence H. Dorcy Foundation to continue our mission to Educate, Provide Nutritious Food for the Hungry, and Respond to Emergencies while focusing on supporting local farmers and ranchers.
