Konea 'O Kukui Garden is a 20-year old restoration project of a 7th generation Native Hawaiian lo'i in North Kohala. The garden serves as a safe place for education, understanding and healing for numerous groups including local schools, university archaeology research projects, addiction recovery support, cultural practitioners, hula hālau, community members, and visitors. All of the experiences in the garden continue to influence founder Nani Svendsen's vision of Kukui: to create and share a place for people of all cultures to experience the blessings of the land together in peace.

This grant request is for \$20,000 and will expand the garden's restoration efforts to include expansion of the native plant collection, a weekly Garden Tour open to residents and visitors to Hawaii Island that shares an authentic voice of the history, culture, and values of this special place, and maintenance of the garden and facilities. The intent is to offer an interactive way to experience the culture, history and natural environment of Hawaii while building economic sustainability for the garden.

Konea 'O Kukui Garden is a 20-year old restoration project of a 7th generation Native Hawaiian lo'i. Konea 'O Kukui Garden began as a personal project of Nani Svendsen, a Kohala native who inherited the property from her family. 20 years ago, Kukui, which means "light or lamp", was an overgrown jungle of invasive trees, broken rock walls, and mosquitoes – all that remained of a once-active homestead with terraced taro patches. It has come back to life, after countless hours of planning and hard work. Kukui's restoration, done primarily by hand, is based on a careful study of the original lo'i and surrounding land.

Konea 'O Kukui has evolved with the help of volunteers and modest amounts of funding to a beautiful native plant garden and active lo'i kalo that serves as a landmark for cultural and environmental preservation in North Kohala. Restored in the traditional way, rock walls create terraces that are stream fed and planted with kalo (taro). Kalo is a traditional staple crop and connects to the origin story of the Hawaiian people. All through word of mouth, the garden has become available as a safe place for education, understanding and healing for numerous groups including local schools, university archaeology research projects, addiction recovery support, cultural practitioners, hula hālau, community members, and visitors. All of the experiences in the garden continue to influence Nani's vision of Kukui: To create and share a place for people of all cultures to experience the blessings of the land together in peace.

Konea 'O Kukui has been an organized project of the North Kohala Community Resource Center (NKCRC) since 2002. NKCRC is a 501(c)3 non-profit with a mission to support successful community projects that benefit North Kohala. NKCRC provides local support, bridges to funding and education for projects that benefit the community. NKCRC serves as the fiscal sponsor for Konea 'O Kukui and ensures the accurate and timely submission of all program and financial reports.

As a lifelong resident of North Kohala and lineal descendant to the lands at Kukui, Nani is shocked by the realization that changes in the community happen so fast. In recent years, with the conversion of land from what was once an unfenced large sugar company holding to many smaller parcels and private owners, the North Kohala community has gradually lost access to historic sites, fishing and food gathering places, and cultural activities. Located on the northern tip of Hawaii island with a population of approximately 6,500, North Kohala is a rural, isolated, and traditionally agricultural community. Nearly all of the former sugar roads leading to the streams, forests, and ocean have been fenced off and gated. The local community misses their once-familiar places.

Moreover, the commotions of commercialism and industry have invaded a traditionally rural community. The pace of life has changed as parents commute long distances to coastal resorts for employment. Illegal drugs and alcohol abuse have destroyed the trust and security of families and neighborhoods and eroded long-standing family values. Many community members are in jeopardy of losing their families and their freedom because of addictions. Many of these individuals say they are grateful for a place like Kukui because it reminds them of better, healthier times. Other garden guests

reveal that people are seeking a place of refuge, free from the distractions and temptations of our industrialized world. They want, for a short time at least, to avoid the artificial sounds, chemical odors, and the invisible yet invasive vibrations of machinery, radio frequencies, cell phones ringing, and other intrusive devices.

Locals and newcomers alike long for the nourishing peace and quiet of this special land enjoyed by many families in years past. Once there, they often reflect on times gone by and their childhood experiences. Youngsters, often for the first time, begin to awaken to a sense of their heritage, and an appreciation of the remarkable accomplishments of their ancestors. They become more attentive, and feel a sense of family and connection as they work and talk together. It is a healing place, and needed by all in our modern times.

Due to Covid, it has been a great challenge for many to adapt to a life of isolation. There is an increased need of people seeking safe, open places. Public places are overcrowded in the community and while Kukui is not open to the public, it is available to guests and small groups through direct inquiry. Kukui creates a safe place that honors the cultural values of Hawai'i and the unique history of North Kohala.

Konea 'O Kukui garden responds to the needs expressed by creating an environment and caring for the plants and animals that inhabit the garden in a way that keeps the history and culture alive. This request is for \$20,000 to support efforts to expand and maintain the garden and offer educational and healing programming. Key objectives of this program include:

- Increase the number and diversity of native and endemic plants and increase educational signage for these plants.
- Offer weekly Garden Tours serving 1,000 participants annually.
- Create and install storyboards in the garden to enhance visitor experience and understanding.
- Facilitate a weekly recovery based healing circle serving 13-15 individuals each week. The recovery circle creates a healing space for individuals who have experienced trauma. Individuals of all ages and all walks of life participate.
- Host four workshops per year for 20 individuals to engage in traditional practice of lo'i restoration and poi making.
- Complete necessary maintenance and repairs to ensure a safe and comfortable experience for all who visit Kukui including installation of a portable toilet, roofing, and painting of the classroom.
- Yearly maintenance of the native plantings and garden with plants including but not limited to: Sandlewood, 'ūlei, pohinahina, 'ilima papa, naupaka, kukui, kamani, milo, 'awapuhi, kou, kupukupu, lau'ae, lauhala, 'ulu, mai'a, 'uala, 'ōlena, pia, ko, hapu'u, ho'io, palapalai, kalo.

A key component of this project is to expand the installation of signs identifying native plants that share their purposes, medical uses, Hawaiian name and scientific name. As the garden is cared so attentively, there is opportunity to plant some of the more delicate native plants that are losing their habitat in the wild due to the increase in invasive species.

Demographics served include individuals of all ages from all walks of life, visitors and residents alike. The careful and intentional cultivation at Kukui has created a place

where substance abuse recovery groups come to heal, hālau reconnect with the plants that are integral to their practice, family reunions celebrate a remembrance of where they come from and a lifestyle where their ancestors thrived. Partnering organizations include University of Hawaii, University of New Mexico Archaeology Dept, Lokahi Treatment Center, Boys to Men mentorship, Hawaii Prepatory Academy, Kokolulu Cancer Retreats, Sierra Club, numerous hula hālau, and more.

The Weekly Garden Tours are open to residents and visitors to Hawaii Island and share an authentic voice of the history, culture, and values of this special place. The intent is to offer guests an interactive way to experience the culture and history of Hawaii. The Garden Tours weave cultural values of family, spirit, and knowledge of the way people lived in earlier times. This program honors, preserves, and perpetuates Hawaiian culture; this opportunity is not orchestrated, prescribed or removed, it is coming from the living experience of a cultural practitioner on ancestral lands.

There is a particular intention to expand reach to engage with Japanese visitors, as a connection to Nani's own background being half Okinowan. She has wisdom to share about what it is like to live in Hawaii, to take on lifestyle of another race, how to handle segregation and how to handle inclusion. Knowing that in Japan inter-racial marriage is only now becoming socially acceptable, she wants to share how Hawaiian people embrace everyone. She has witnessed how that has impacted Japanese visitors in the past and how that expands ideas of what is possible in terms of embracing our humanity.

Support for this project will also provide for necessary improvements to ensure the safety and accessibility for visitors to the garden. These improvements include installation of a portable lua, creation of a brochure to advertise the tours, and placement of additional storyboards that enhance visitor experience and understanding by sharing the history and genealogy of the garden.

Depending on COVID regulations, this program supports continued and ongoing opportunities for educational and research groups to experience the garden, see what a functioning lo'i system looks like and increase their sensitivity to the work they do in Hawai'i.

Support from the Dorcy Foundation Funding will support the expansion of native plants and the ongoing maintenance of the lo'I to ensure the garden can remain a space of education and healing long into the future. In addition the support to launch the Weekly Garden Tours are intended to build financial stability and self-sufficiency into the structure of the garden. The income from the Garden Tours will contribute to covering the ongoing maintenance costs necessary to upkeep the garden and support its long-term success.

Nani Svendsen is the primary project organizer, she is a Native Hawaiian cultural practitioner and has dedicated the last 20 years to restoring Konea 'O Kukui and ensuring it's long term sustainability for future generations. She is the owner and President of Lama Kukui 'O Kohala, Inc., a corporation operating He Nani Florist since 1983, and Kohala's Guest House since 1990, Nani is a successful businesswoman, and a well-respected volunteer in the community. She owns Fresh Off the Grid Farms which operates a farm and food trailer seeing over 200 customers per day. Nani is a cornerstone in the Kohala community and has a track record of successful project management and community organizing. She is joined by her husband Don Sevendsen

who is a licensed contractor who oversees and manages the construction and building projects at Konea 'O Kukui. In addition, Nani works with skilled and experienced gardeners and landscape designers to maintain and improve the gardens, native plant habitat, and trails at Konea 'O Kukui. There are numerous individuals and community groups who contribute their time and resources to the successful and long term sustainability of this precious cultural resource in North Kohala.

This project brings with it 20 years of deep community support. In the future we will secure funding through community donations and grants from private foundations. In addition, the Garden Tours are intended to build financial stability and self-sufficiency into the structure of the garden. The income from the Garden Tours will contribute to cover the ongoing maintenance costs necessary to upkeep the garden and support its long-term success.
