KARES Mission Statement: A widespread interest to create an organization adhering to a "no kill" philosophy gave birth to the Kohala Animal Relocation & Education Service (KARES) which serves the entire Big Island of Hawaii. The mission of KARES is to rescue and relocate abused, abandoned and stray domestic animals, to provide temporary housing for them through our foster care network and to facilitate adoptions into caring permanent homes.

KARES focuses on community education to promote responsible pet ownership and to prevent animal cruelty. KARES raises awareness about the causes of animal overpopulation and advocates alternative humane solutions for pet population control including spay and neuter. KARES makes possible affordable or free spay/neuter (S/N) surgeries and conducts S/N clinics in various community locations, those without readily accessible low cost or free S/N services. KARES emphasis is on reaching community residents who do not have the financial resources to provide these surgeries for their companion pets, especially the elderly and economically-troubled residents.

**Note:** KARES services are primarily devoted to dogs, although countless numbers of cats are helped each year.

**Request:** \$25,000

The needs to be addressed: KARES' Program of Rescue and Preparation for Adoption including Spay and Neuter is trying to address both the overpopulation of dogs on Hawaii Island and an insufficient number of homes for rescued stray, lost or abandoned dogs, and also owner-surrendered healthy dogs that frequently have wound up in high kill shelters. KARES' program is directed to the rehabilitative medical/surgical and dental care needs to make pets suitable for placement into forever homes. No dogs are released for adoption until they are sterilized. KARES emphasizes spay and neuter (S/N) to prevent unwanted puppies that will further contribute to the canine overpopulation.

KARES' **Prevention/ Intake Diversion Program** to help keep pets in their homes promotes pet retention by provision of temporary supplies of pet food, or free veterinary care for ill, injured or aged companion pets of low income families. The intention is to retain the pet at home, in the past pets were surrendered an overcrowded shelter, requesting euthanasia of the pet because they cannot afford the medical care costs, or abandoning the pet. Currently there is no open intake, public animal shelter on Hawaii Island, thus KARES is often the last resort for residents needing help with their pets. This aspect of our programs is one of compassion to preserve the Hawaii Island family lifestyle that often includes one or more pets in a household.

KARES' Experience and Animal Data - KARES advocates S/N as the humane method to control and reduce the canine population. This is essential for the entire island but paramount for low income families that cannot afford to care for unwanted or unplanned litters of puppies...not only for food but for health care. KARES' goal is to 'Fix' all dogs within a household. We believe our S/N program has effectively reduced the number of stray dogs taken into our care (192 in 2020 vs. 84 in 2021), decreased the number of canine transfers from impound, namely healthy dogs that were candidates for euthanasia (130 transfers into KARES in 2020 vs. 86 in 2021). The County of Hawaii animal control impound facility now euthanizes 25% of animals each month. KARES had 575 dogs in our care in 2020 and 456 in 2021. Some of these reductions reflect our continued free S/N program (453 in 2020 and 424 in 2021), and successful adoptions rates in the last 2 years. Many canine adoption candidates require acute or extensive medical attention depending on the situation.

**How KARES is addressing the problem:** Bullet point summaries are provided to describe the multiple approaches to addressing canine population control, foster care and preparation for adoption of homeless dogs and retention of companion dogs with their families.

- KARES will provide medical/surgical care of homeless dogs in preparation for adoption and intervene to expedite emergency care for seriously ill or injured pets, as we have done for the past 13 years. Basic vet services will involve wound repairs, lab tests, dental care, and treatment for external & internal parasites, chronic skin conditions, tumors, eye issues, vaccines, and pain management. These services are also extended to economically-troubled families who are encouraged to keep pets with them in their homes, rather than contribute to a cadre of homeless pets. All services are free to pet owners.
- KARES has negotiated discounted fees with a few Hawaii County veterinarians in order to provide medical, surgical and urgent care to dogs. This includes a reduced fee for spays (\$125-\$150) and neuters (\$100 -\$ 125) for dogs of all weights and ages. Costs are higher for pregnant or in heat females or cryptorchid males. Standard vet fees are typically at least 100% or more for spay & neuter procedures.
- KARES has a dedicated dental care program with Kohala Veterinary Clinic for prophylaxis and teeth extractions under anesthesia for a set fee of \$300 for dogs in preparation for adoption. This low fee is also extended to owned companion dogs referred by KARES.
- KARES has conducted free canine (and feline) spay/neuter (S/N) surgery clinics in underserved community locations with no affordable or free services are available the purpose is to control and reduce the overpopulation of pets on the island. In these clinics, surgeries can be performed on 30-40 dogs per day, thus even further reducing the usual surgical fees. Private veterinary clinics are also utilized.
- KARES network of foster care homes have been accommodating as many as 35 dogs per day. Pet food and supplies, as well as medications, are provided to the caregiver as needed for dogs on their journey to adoption.

Demographics of our Hawaii Island community: The poverty rate in Hawaii County is 12.2%; however, KARES realizes that a far greater number of Hawaii residents continue to experience serious economic hardships into 2022 resulting from unemployment associated with the COVID-19 pandemic. The economic adversity in low income families leads to inadequate health care and food insecurity for the residents, but poverty also affects family pets. Even in pre-pandemic times KARES found that  $\sim$ 75% of pets coming to our canine spay & neuter surgery clinics in community locations had previously never been seen by a veterinarian. The economic downturn over the last several years has resulted in families losing their homes and some moving to the mainland for employment opportunities. Currently Hawaii Island has no open-intake, municipal shelter. As a consequence we now have increased numbers of stray dogs, and as well, abandonment of dogs - released into the wild or left chained in yards. KARES currently provides at least 250 one-pound packets of pet food weekly to residences coming to a drive-by Community Food Bank in Ocean View. During the height of the pandemic in 2020 and 2021, KARES gave pet food packets to 500 – 600 residents weekly at the Waimea Community Food Bank. Although KARES focuses on providing services to low income families who cannot afford care for their companion pets, in reality we have never turned away anyone who seeks our assistance.

Number of island families and their pets served by our programs: KARES anticipates that at least 100 or more companion dogs of all ages will benefit with direct health care assistance from the Dorcy Foundation investment. Aid will be primarily given to the many foster care to adoption candidates that require acute medical attention, basic wellness care (treatment for external and internal parasites, vaccinations, heart worm tests and treatments), or extensive medical/surgical, or dental care, and in some cases behavioral training. As the Dorcy Foundation provides general operating support, KARES also wishes to hire a part time office assistant to deal with the myriad of weekly phone calls, to help coordinate rescue and transportation to veterinary clinics, coordinate homeless pet placements into foster care homes, volunteer services and adoption events, and to help manage and acquire critical statistics databases from databases. Since 2009 KARES has never had a paid employee.

As KARES services to the community have substantially increased we need to train a dedicated employee. Thus, the Dorcy Foundation investment will be far reaching to help all of KARES programs that in 2021 served 900 pets through rescue, foster care/adoptions and spay and neuter surgeries.

**Geographic region served:** KARES has been and will continue to provide services throughout the County of Hawaii. Our organization, comprised of all volunteers and no paid staff, has dedicated and tireless individuals in all parts of the island involved in rescue, pet transport to vet offices and S/N clinics and providing foster care for homeless pets awaiting adoption.

How Dorcy Foundation grant money would make a difference to KARES and KARES' clientele: A Laurence H. Dorcy Foundation investment will help KARES improve the quality of life or save the lives of rescued, surrendered, stray or abandoned dogs as part of the medical/ surgical, and/or dental care they may require in preparation for their adoption, and as well, enable retention of pets with their owners. Canine S/N is crucial to this program prior to adoption but also imperative to humanely control and reduce the overpopulation of dogs on the island. Your funds will contribute toward the anticipated adoption of at least 165 or more dogs, and toward the anticipated sterilization of at least 450 or more dogs in in a 12-month period.

Primary funding sources: Efforts for sustainability of our programs involves 1) continued submission of grant applications to the County of Hawaii, and corporate and private foundations that support animal welfare advocacy, as well through receipt of private donations, and 2) supplementing the cost of excessive pet medical expenses with social media appeals (KARES Facebook page) and requests for assistance from "Angels". Grants for restricted programs in 2021-22 have been received from the County of Hawaii's non-profit grant program, Petco Love (formerly the Petco Foundation), Grey Muzzle Organization (medical/dental care of dogs >7 years of age), Bissell Pet Foundation and the DJ&T Foundation.
