

Thank you for inviting us to apply for a grant from the Dorcy Foundation following Tiffini Connelly's recent introduction. Assistance Dogs of Hawaii was founded in 2000, is nationally accredited and is the largest provider of Assistance Dogs in Hawaii. We provide services, free of charge, to more than 16,000 of Hawaii's most vulnerable residents each year.

Our main campus is on Maui, but a large number of our beneficiaries resides on Oahu. We've had an office space in Honolulu for the past twelve years that has been essential for meetings, interviews and trainings. With the expansion of our program, we have outgrown our former location and are in need of a larger, wheelchair accessible office and training area. We have secured most of the funding and are respectfully requesting a \$100,000 Capital Campaign grant to help us complete this purchase.

In addition to providing Service Dogs for people with disabilities, we also place fulltime Hospital Dogs that work throughout the state at trauma centers, cancer clinics and children's hospitals. We also provide Courthouse Dogs that work at child advocacy centers and prosecutor's offices throughout Hawaii. These dogs help children throughout the difficult legal process.

We appreciate Mr. Dorcy's passion for animals as well as helping cancer patients. The new ADH Honolulu office will ensure the continuation of our Hospital Dog Program for many years to come. Our Hospital Dogs bring comfort and companionship to over 2,000 cancer patients each year in Hawaii. Oftentimes, patients have not wanted to return for treatment but will do so knowing the Hospital Dog will be there to comfort them.

Laurence H. Dorcy Foundation Assistance Dogs of Hawaii Grant Proposal

Amount of request:

Assistance Dogs of Hawaii (ADH) respectfully requests \$100,000 to assist with the purchase of a \$560,000 office space in Honolulu. Our services have expanded statewide over the years and we have outgrown our previous office location. We are seeking to establish our headquarters in a larger, wheelchair accessible space that will be used for interviews with applicants, follow-up appointments with our graduates, puppy training classes for our volunteers, and meetings.

The need being addressed:

There has been an increasing demand for all types of Assistance Dogs statewide since our program began in 2000. The therapeutic benefits Assistance Dogs provide is recognized by health care professionals, human services agencies, first responders, and schools to help improve people's physical, social, emotional, and mental well-being. This has provided us with the opportunity to serve a greater number of people in Hawaii. These include children and adults with physical disabilities, hospitalized patients, disabled veterans, seniors in assisted living, and children who are victims of crime.

How your organization is meeting that need:

Assistance Dogs of Hawaii is meeting the need for more Assistance Dogs in Hawaii by providing professionally trained Service Dogs, Hospital Dogs, Courthouse Dogs and School Facility Dogs, free of charge, for those in need. Assistance Dogs of Hawaii is the largest provider of Assistance Dogs in Hawaii and to date has graduated over 200 teams.

Service Dog Program: Service Dogs are placed with children and adults with disabilities that limit their mobility, including those with cerebral palsy, multiple sclerosis, muscular dystrophy, and spinal cord injuries. Service Dogs help their partners by performing tasks such as turning on and off lights, opening doors, picking up objects, and pulling wheelchairs. They also help to increase confidence and independence for their partners. This allows for greater community engagement, social connectedness, and employment opportunities that may not have been available before partnering with their service dog.

Hospital Dog Program: ADH's Hospital Dog Program is the only one of its kind in the State of Hawaii. We provide Hospital Dogs free of charge to hospitals, nursing facilities, cancer clinics, and rehabilitation centers statewide. Hospital Dogs work full time with a medical professional to provide comfort and physical support for patients of all ages during their greatest times of need. This includes patients recovering from critical head injuries and life altering strokes; children and adults undergoing cancer treatments; elderly patients with dementia; teenagers with mental health challenges, and so many more.

ADH Hospital Dogs have provided support to 80,000 patients in Hawaii, including those at the following facilities:

- Kapi'olani Medical Center for Women and Children
- Queen's Medical Center
- Straub Medical Center
- Shriners Children's Hospital of Hawaii
- Maui Medical Center
- Rehab Hospital of the Pacific
- Life Rehab Center
- Imua Physical Therapy
- Queen's West Oahu Cancer Center

Courthouse Dog Program: ADH places trained Courthouse Dogs in prosecutors' offices and child advocacy centers across the state. Courthouse Dogs help children who are victims of crime to find their voice throughout the difficult legal process; including during forensic interviews, medical exams, and even while testifying in court. Our program has made it possible for Hawaii to become the first state in the nation with Courthouse Dogs in every jurisdiction. Since this program began in 2010, ADH Courthouse Dogs have provided support to over 12,000 children who are victims of crime in Hawaii.

The demographic of your clientele:

Assistance Dogs of Hawaii (ADH) provides services to individuals of all ages with disabilities and special needs, seniors in assisted living, victims of crime, hospitalized patients and their families, frontline workers, veterans with disabilities, and the homeless. Over 60% of our beneficiaries are children. Over 40% of those we serve are living below the poverty level.

The number of individuals served by your program:

Through our various programs, we had the opportunity to serve 16,000 Hawaii residents in 2022 and that number has been increasing every year. All of our programs are delivered free of charge to ensure fair accessibility for Hawaii's most vulnerable residents.

The geographic region covered:

This grant will serve residents throughout the state of Hawaii.

How Dorcy Foundation grant money would make a difference to your organization and clientele:

Assistance Dog of Hawaii is a grass roots organization based on Maui. We receive no government funding and rely solely on donations from individuals, foundations and businesses. A grant from the Dorcy Foundation will allow us to expand our operations and help more

people in Hawaii by meeting the growing need for all types of Assistance Dogs statewide. A wheelchair accessible office in Honolulu will ensure that we can continue to provide professionally trained Assistance Dogs and lifetime follow-up support free of charge for those with the greatest needs.
