

- Hope Lodge is a 20-room lodging facility for cancer patients and caregivers who must travel to Oahu for treatment.
- Standard cancer treatments run 4-6 weeks.
- Hope Lodge serves 400 cancer patients and their caregivers each year with lodging and transportation.
- 2022: 521 cancer patients served at the lodge.
- Lodge guests are from the other Hawaiian Islands and Guam, Samoa and other Pacific islands.
- Hope Lodge annual operating budget is \$890,000. No government support.
 All fundraised.
- Capital request is to purchase outdoor furnishings for Hope Lodge's community and private reflection spaces, including benches, chairs, tables,

American Cancer Society Organizational Background

Founded in 1913, the American Cancer Society (ACS) is the preeminent cancer-fighting organization with a vision of ending cancer as we know it for everyone. Our mission is to improve the lives of people with cancer and their families through advocacy, research, and patient support, to ensure everyone has an opportunity to prevent, detect, treat, and survive cancer. Thanks partly to our contributions, 4.1 million cancer deaths have been averted in the US since 1991, when cancer rates were highest.

We work to establish and enhance collaborative partnerships with shared goals to eliminate cancer disparities, improve the lives of people with cancer and their families, assist cancer professionals in providing quality care, and provide anyone impacted by cancer with the support, information, and resources they need from prevention to detection and diagnosis, through treatment and survivorship, and for some, the end of life.

But the work is far from complete, as we strive to reach our goal of a 40% drop in cancer deaths by 2035, ACS is committed to moving us even closer to a world without cancer by continuing to build on this progress. We are working to achieve this goal through targeted efforts that include investments in research, improving equitable access to care, urging people to get screened, and reducing long-standing disparities in cancer prevention, diagnosis, and treatment outcomes.



Everyone deserves the opportunity to benefit from progress in the fight against cancer. We are dedicated to eliminating disparities in the cancer burden defined in terms of socioeconomic status, income, disability status, age, race/ethnicity, geographic location, sex, gender identity, and sexual orientation. Evidence-based health equity principles are the foundation of everything we do as we work to eliminate barriers and ensure everyone has the same opportunity to prevent, detect, treat, and survive cancer.

Our Presence and Partnerships in Hawai'i

- Annually, our National Cancer Information Center engaged over 300,000 calls/live chats with more than 100,000 people nationwide. Locally, 1,185 unique individuals in Hawai'i connected with ACS, resulting in 3,690 requests for information, programs, and services.
- ACS has long-standing relationships with the leading medical facilities in Hawai'i including The Queen's
 Medical Center, Cancer Center of Hawai'i, Kaiser Permanente Moanalua Medical Center, Kuakini Medical
 Center, Pali Momi Medical Center, Kapiolani Medical Center for Women and Children, and Hawai'i Cancer
 Care. ACS works with our healthcare system partners to refer cancer patients to our resources and
 programs and to coordinate transportation for patients to and from treatment. The ability to reach most
 of the new patients on our neighboring islands is maintained through these collaborative relationships
 with oncology doctors, nurses, and clinics throughout Hawai'i.

The Need: Access to Cancer Care in Hawai'i

This year, ACS estimates that 8,670 Hawai'i residents will be diagnosed with cancer and 2,650 will lose the life to this terrible disease.

The American Cancer Society in Hawai'i Pacific was chartered in 1959 by committed and passionate Hawai'i business leaders and medical professionals who wanted to fight this disease and save the lives of their family members, colleagues and friends. The community vision, both then and now, is that cancer patients in Hawai'i and the Pacific deserve the best care possible. At ACS we take pride in our contributions to the unprecedented progress in reducing incidences of cancer and mortality rates and the improvement of the quality of life for Hawai'i residents who receive a cancer diagnosis.

Successful cancer care is about more than treatment. It's about ensuring everyone has an equal chance to get the care they need and understand their treatment and options at each stage of their cancer experience. Unfortunately, too many are not reaping the benefits of the advances in prevention, early detection, and care, especially for vulnerable and underserved populations.







Addressing the Need: Giving Hope a Home

A cancer diagnosis is the beginning of a long journey to recovery, often quite literally. Neighbor island residents with advanced cancers or those in need of specialized chemotherapy or radiation, advanced cancer treatment, stem cell transplants, bone marrow transplants, reconstructive breast surgery, or other complicated surgery must travel to Oʻahu or the mainland for an extended period of time, as they complete treatment or enroll in clinical trials. The costs of traveling to and from treatment can create insurmountable physical, emotional, and financial burdens during what is already a challenging time and can also perpetuate disparities in care for groups such as the elderly, rural residents, and the medically underserved.

The costs of traveling to and from treatment can create insurmountable physical, emotional, and financial burdens during what is already a challenging time and can also perpetuate disparities in care for groups such as the elderly, rural residents, and the medically underserved. Standard lodging costs for a patient receiving treatment for 4-6 weeks could be between \$6,000 to \$10,000, with exceptionally high lodging costs on O'ahu. The cost of treatment can deplete savings, result in unemployment, and is one of our nation's leading causes of bankruptcy. Access to affordable lodging is a critical factor in whether cancer patients receive and complete their potentially lifesaving treatment.

American Cancer Society Hope Lodge communities are changing that. With 31 locations across the country, our Hope Lodge communities are more than just a place to sleep; they offer a community of caring and resources that give patients and caregivers hope when home is far away, including health and wellness programs and social interaction. The American Cancer Society Clarence T.C. Ching Hope Lodge in Honolulu provides temporary housing free of charge to cancer patients and their caregivers when they must stay on O'ahu for cancer care and treatment.

Transportation from Hope Lodge to their treatment center is also provided at no cost. More than just a roof over their heads, Hope Lodge is an invaluable resource that helps patients access care and provides a nurturing community that gives patients and caregivers hope when their home is far away. Hope Lodge provides a safe and supportive environment for cancer patients, including support groups, cancer education materials, and access to quality cancer care information.

Since opening its doors in 2016, Hope Lodge Hawai'i has hosted thousands of guests from all over Hawai'i and across the Pacific Island region. Located next to the Queen's Medical Center and near other treatment centers in the area, Hope Lodge has 20 private guest suites available to cancer patients traveling to O'ahu for treatment. In a typical year, Hope Lodge serves around 800 guests – 400 cancer patients and 400 caregivers.

In 2024, we anticipate Hope Lodge Hawai'i will provide approximately 9,000 nights of lodging to cancer patients and their caregivers, saving guests more than \$2 million in lodging costs.

Funding Hope Lodge Hawai'i

The \$891,000 annual budget for Hope Lodge Hawai'i is funded by a diverse mix of restricted and unrestricted funds raised in Hawai'i and used exclusively in Hawai'i. Approximately 99% of total general revenue is derived from support from our residents and we receive no government support for our operations. Our most significant sources of local support are special event grassroots fundraising; Relay for Life events are approximately 35% of our total public support, while other community events, including Making Strides Against Breast Cancer make up an additional 10%. Planned giving income composes another 16%, and the remainder is dispersed across a diverse portfolio of direct response, major gifts and campaigns. Long term support of Hope Lodge Hawai'i includes the Friends of Hope Lodge annual giving program to sustain future operations, grant funding, planned gifts to sustain the operations in the future, and yearly fundraising efforts.

Hope Lodge Hawai'i Primary Funding Sources in 2023

- Private foundations \$512,000
- Corporate contributions \$108,000
- Other individual and corporate contributions \$414,965

In 2023, the Laurence H. Dorcy Hawaiian Foundation provided a generous \$25,000 gift in support of Hope Lodge Hawaii. The American Cancer Society is grateful for your support and the positive impact you have made in the lives of cancer patients. Because of your support, the American Cancer Society has been able to continue providing no-cost lodging to cancer patients and caregivers from neighboring islands who must travel to O'ahu for treatment and cancer care.

Cancer patient and caregiver, Simeonica, shares her story after staying at Hope Lodge Hawai'i:

After I found out about having Brain Tumor Cancer, I was blessed and lucky to check in with the Hope Lodge because I do not have any family here in Hawai'i to stay with. When I checked in here, people around me were kind, friendly, and nice; it was like a home of happiness and peace. The Hope Lodge is an amazing place, a place where we call a family home, where we laugh, make every memory together, we do everything together as one, The Hope Lodge staff and workers are very kind people, they will assist you and make sure you feel safe and happy. I see them as angels of God. No matter where I go or stay, this will always be my first home in Hawai'i.

Your Funding at Work in 2023

We know that the best way to improve the lives of people with cancer and their families is to support them at every step of their cancer journey. Thanks to you, Hawai'i and Pacific residents do not make the journey alone. When they travel far from home for the best possible treatment, they don't just find a place to stay, they find a community of support and an emotional connection with others facing a similar journey.

In 2023, Hope Lodge Hawai'i provided 8,096 nights of lodging to 868 unduplicated cancer patients and caregivers. Of those 42% were from the Big Island; 26% Maui and Molokai; 12% Kauai; and the remainder from Lanai, Guam, American Samoa and other Pacific islands. **Estimated total savings in lodging in 2023 was \$1,000,000.** The average length of stay was 13 nights, but many stayed several weeks with our most extended guests staying nine months through their cancer journey. Additionally, Hope Lodge provided 3,085 rides to and from treatment centers for our guests.

Outdoor Furnishings - A Gift from the Laurence H. Dorcy Foundation

Through your generosity in 2023, we were able to purchase brand new outdoor seating options for our Hope Lodge guests in our "Garden of Hope". Cancer patients have used these beautiful furnishings to read, meditate, work, and other activities.

The funding that you have provided has offered so much more than a place to sit. Your donation has provided a a healing place to rest and recuperate. Families have also utilized the space to have challenging and emotional conversations in the quiet of nature. Guests continue to compliment the Hope Lodge facilities cleanliness and ease of use. Capital investments, like yours, allow us to continue providing exceptional levels of comfort and service to those who need it most.
