#### 1. Background Information

Malama Kai Foundation is a 501(c)(3) tax-exempt, not-for-profit organization, dedicated to ocean stewardship through community service and public education in Hawaii. Founded in January 1991, we raise funds in the form of small and large donations and grants in order to implement or sponsor projects that will help conserve Hawaii's coastal and marine resources and educate the public about these resources. For over 25 years, Malama Kai Foundation has demonstrated its ability to raise funds and partner with government agencies, local business and conservation organizations to accomplish significant projects to protect Hawaii's nearshore waters and ecosystems. We are honored to work with the Hawaiian Chieftain organization and, in this instance, serve as their fiscal sponsor.

The vessel Hawaiian Chieftain, briefly known as the Spirit of Larinda, was commissioned by Laurence H. Dorcy, Jr. and built by Lahaina Welding Co. in 1988 in Lahaina, Maui. The 104' gaff-rigged topsail ketch is unique - with the rig of a 19th-century trading vessel and a modern triple keel, shallow draft hull and thus highly maneuverable in shallow waters. In fact, under Dorcy's vision, Hawaiian Chieftain was designed for shallow coastal access, cargo capacity, passenger capabilities, and extensive renewable wind derived power sourcing.

Her maiden voyage, in 1990, was to French Polynesia. She arrived in Papeete on April 20 of that year. She was based in Sausalito, CA for many years, providing experiential programs teaching

elementary school children about West
Coast exploration and trade in the late
1700s. Since 2021, Hawaiian Chieftain
has undergone a complete overhaul and
restoration journey in collaboration with
the distinguished boat builders, spar
makers, and rigging masters of Port
Townsend, Washington. During this time,
Hawaiian Chieftain has been supporting
and collaborating with the Northwest
School of Boat Building providing a work
force platform for graduating students. As
we are visitors to the North Pacific, we
have prioritized collaboration with Salish

Nation youth groups and other area tribal entities working to empower indigenous peoples.





#### Need Being Addressed and How our Proposal Meets that Need

The ultimate objective of this requested funding is to facilitate the *Hawaiian Chieftain's* return to its home waters to provide day sails, sail training, and maritime and marine conservation educational programs throughout the Hawaiian Islands. After many years operating throughout California, Oregon, and Washington, *Hawaiian Chieftain* fell into a terrible state of disrepair. It




Figure 2. Chieftain's condition when purchased in 2021. Port Townsend, Washington.

was with admiration, respect, and privately funded stewardship that new owners Matt and Aubrey Wilson were determined to save the vessel from being decommissioned. Much restoration work has already occurred. Malama Kai Foundation, on behalf of the Hawaiian Chieftain organization, is seeking a Capital Campaign Grant for the purpose of finishing the multi-year restoration of *Hawaiian Chieftain* and for its return voyage from Washington State.

The programming we will provide Hawaii residents and visitors will be heavily focused on historical maritime education and sail training, marine conservation, endangered and threatened species conservation, Hawaiian history and cultural education, sustainable business strategy and community development, social impact and environmental justice, as well as climate readiness and adaptation. We plan to accomplish these tangible and much needed goals through collaborative efforts and agreements with NGOs, local businesses, local

non-profits, philanthropic foundations, along with Federal, State, and County agencies.

#### 3. Geography, Demographics, and Individuals Being Served

The Hawaiian Chieftain organization's mission statement is to "explore Hawaiian maritime history and inspire global conservation for the seventh generation through traditional sailing and seamanship aboard Hawaiian Chieftain". Being ohana-owned and operated, with sustainable business management at its core, the Hawaiian Chieftain organization plans to uplift the Hawaiian community and youth for generations to come. We will work with educational institutions and local schools for the purpose of educational field trips with emphasis on traditional sailing, Hawaiian culture, history, sustainability, and marine conservation. We plan to seek opportunities for Hawaiian Chieftain to work with NOAA's National Marine Sanctuaries and Marine Debris Programs, and the Hawaiian Chieftain organization is in the process of seeking





permitting and other authorizations to establish formal partnerships with NOAA, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, The Nature Conservancy (Hawaii and Palmyra programs), and other organizations working within the Papahanaumokukea and Pacific Remote Islands Marine National Monuments. We also intend to transport goods, supplies, equipment and people to remote field stations, marine national monuments, national marine sanctuaries, and heritage sites, including cultural practitioners, citizen scientists, research scientists, educators, and students to the nearby.

Above all, the Hawaiian Chieftain organization is prioritizing working with Hawaiian community driven programs and groups to elevate the opportunities to our underserved communities and facilitating career opportunities in the maritime industry, such as traditional sailing, engineering, maintenance, and training in Western and Polynesian navigation techniques.

#### 4. Amount Requested

Malama Kai Foundation is humbly seeking \$100,000 to support the Hawaiian Chieftain organization.

#### 5. How Dorcy Foundation Funds Will Make a Difference

Working diligently with the United States Coast Guard, Hawaiian Chieftain is set to achieve the

appropriate Certificate of Inspection to maximize the scope of opportunity to achieve our mission. After the completion of sea trials throughout Puget Sound, we intend to travel down the Pacific West coast before our journey across the Pacific, potentially collaborating with NOAA's National Marine Sanctuaries Program and associated community groups on education and outreach activities. Once Hawaiian Chieftain returns to Hawaii it will be homeported in Kailua Kona, Hawaii Island. Due to the recent and heartbreaking decimation of Lahaina, our immediate intentions are

to assist with appropriate, long term community relief efforts.





While much time, effort, and funding has already been invested into restoring the vessel, Dorcy Foundation funding is needed for:

- 1) final restoration components, such as a) galley equipment and installation, b) interior finish woodwork, c) cargo hatch refurbishment and replacement, and d) running rigging installation, and
- 2) Preparing training, and supplying Hawaiian Chieftain's Pacific crossing home to Hawaii.

A contribution from Laurence H. Dorcy Hawaiian Foundation will also support Hawaiian Chieftain organization staff, particularly as they finalize a business plan during these final steps of the restoration and return. We believe that the *Hawaiian Chieftain* project is highly consistent with the mission, interest, history, and values of the Foundation. *Mahalo nui loa* for the opportunity to be considered for your support!
