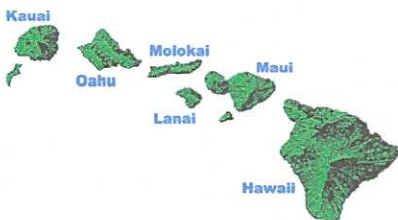

Pacific Primate Sanctuary (PPS) is requesting support from the Laurence H. Dorcy Hawaiian Foundation.

Grant Request

The intention of ***Malama Ola the Monkeys*** (To Care for the Health and Lives of the Primates at Pacific Primate Sanctuary) is to provide for the wellbeing of the animals by ensuring they receive proper nutrition and medical care. The sanctuary estimates the total cost to purchase food and supplies, and to pay for medical care from January 2024-December 2024 to be \$33,000. We are requesting \$15,000 towards this grant.

Description of our Organization

Since 1984, Pacific Primate Sanctuary has maintained a federally authorized conservation program for threatened and endangered New World Monkeys. The Sanctuary is a 501(C)(3) nonprofit organization, providing rehabilitation and permanent care to threatened, endangered, and distressed primates from laboratories, the pet trade, and tourist attractions. PPS is a volunteer-based organization, operating solely on contributions from compassionate individuals and private foundations. We do not receive any government funds for our work.

Pacific Primate Sanctuary is grounded in the belief that all beings are equally sacred. For the past 35 years, we have learned how to nurture and care for abused primates. We have witnessed traumatized animals slowly heal and become whole again through our rehabilitation efforts. Coming from research laboratories where, for generations, they had never seen the outside world, their arrival into the green world has evoked wonder and joy. They can move freely through the greenery and feel the rain and sun on their bodies and the wind through their fur for the remainder of their lives.

The Sanctuary is located in Hawaii, where the indigenous people have a long history of unique customs, practices and beliefs. Since our inception, Pacific Primate Sanctuary has embraced traditional Hawaiian cultural and spiritual values, and these principles and ethics are intrinsic to all aspects of our work. Hawaiian *Kupuna* (elders), along with five other spiritual leaders, were present to bless our new facility, and *I Kona Mau Lima*, a hula troupe, honored the Sanctuary by performing. Ancient Hawaiians had an authentic and compelling way of viewing the world. They held that all things are connected to one another and to the Source. The Hawaiians consider themselves stewards of the *'Aina*, this Earth, and are responsible for caring for it, and protecting it for their children. Pacific Primate Sanctuary embodies this philosophy, and believes it is our *kuleana* (responsibility) to protect and preserve the land, and care for other beings with compassion.

PPS volunteers nurture the land, growing fresh fruits and vegetables for the animals, as well as propagating plants for their enclosures. The animals are cared for with skill, dedication and the respect which should be given to all beings with whom we share the world. We utilize non-toxic, biodegradable cleaning supplies,

purchase locally, reuse and recycle as much as possible. We believe that caring for the land and the animals, and returning to the value systems of native Hawaiians, is vital to restoring our planet and returning it to a state of equilibrium. International interns, students, and volunteers are provided with extensive education and training in primate rehabilitation, caregiving, and facility maintenance through our Resident Internship Program and local Volunteer Program. Our mission and values impact each individual in the PPS community, helping to instill a sense of compassion and altruism towards our fellow beings and an enduring respect for the planet. We offer no-cost environmental education, through Sanctuary outreach programs and an extensive website, which illuminate the need for conservation of native environments and our local, national and global stewardship responsibilities. Consciousness-raising, involving animal welfare, conservation and our implementation of Hawaiian values, is also achieved through online newsletters, our newly renovated website and social media.

Grant Details

Pacific Primate Sanctuary is home to 20 New World Primates. Most of the monkeys at Pacific Primate Sanctuary are considered *geriatric*. Aging animals face many health challenges, including weight loss, decreased mobility, higher incidence of chronic illness, and weakened immune systems. PPS caregivers are trained to provide in-house emergency and medical care. Maintaining an operational and well-stocked infirmary ensures that PPS Staff can perform medical care in a prompt, proficient manner. The Sanctuary continues to see an increase in individuals needing diagnostic tests and medical procedures, performed by our veterinarian, including ultrasound, bloodwork, culture and sensitivity testing, and x-rays. Being elderly, the animals have longer recovery times; additional supplements and medications are needed to support their extended treatment.

The funding for this program will keep the Sanctuary's infirmary sufficiently equipped so PPS Staff can provide immediate emergency care. Trained staff members administer subcutaneous fluids and medications, examine specimens, and perform physical examinations. The PPS primary Veterinarians, Dr. Butler and Dr. Woodworth, create customized treatment plans. These plans include diagnoses of medical problems, prescriptions for appropriate medication and supplements for each individual, as well as customized diets to meet their nutritional needs.

Pacific Primate Sanctuary's mission is to protect and preserve vulnerable primates and to train and educate future conservationists. We deeply resonate with the mission of the Laurence H. Dorcy Hawaiian Foundation and feel joined in our mutual desire to preserve and respect Hawaiian Cultural values. We hope that you are similarly moved by the Sanctuary's mission and can offer PPS assistance. Your contributions will help us to keep this good work going— caring for the monkeys, protecting and serving their at-risk species, sharing our respect for Hawaiian values, and educating our young people. We look forward to hearing from you, and we would be honored to have the Laurence H. Dorcy Foundation's partnership in our life saving work.
