Conservation Council for Hawai'i ("CCH") is dedicated to protecting native Hawaiian plants, animals, and ecosystems for future generations.

# Using Community Education to Help Protect Hawai'i's Native Biodiversity

Hawai'i is home to hundreds of native species that are found nowhere else in the world, and nearly all are now threatened or endangered and face potential extinction. Non-native mammalian predators, including pigs and dogs, have caused (or contributed to) 58% of the extinctions of birds, mammals, and reptiles in the last 500 years (Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences, 2016). Our endemic and endangered species, from forest birds to insects

to rare plants to terrestrial snails, across the Hawaiian Islands are greatly impacted by these non-native predators and invasive species. We need to protect them from potential predators or the effects of habitat destruction caused by the myriad of non-native invasive species.

One way CCH strives to meet this need is through our public educational posters. Since 1970, CCH has annually produced an educational poster to spread awareness about critical Hawaiian conservation issues. The primary goal of these posters is to educate and support a future conservation-minded generation that will carry on the work of protecting the wildlife and wildlands of our islands. For each poster, we commission a local artist to create artwork depicting a specific cause, issue, or species, and have this artwork produced into a poster. On the back of the poster, we have a teacher's guide printed to explain the conservation issue and what individuals can do to help. These teacher guides are written by local experts and cited for further research and study. We then distribute these posters to every public, private and language immersion school (419 total schools) in the state of Hawai'i, as well as every Hawai'i public library (51 total libraries). The teachers can then use these posters as part of their curriculum to inform our younger generations. We also send this poster to each member of our mailing list, currently just under 3,700, to further build a national voice in defense of Hawai'i's endangered wildlife. Additionally, posters are sent to every state and legislative office in Hawai'i, and we distribute these posters at various community outreach events that we attend, where we can engage with our local residents and visitors about conservation issues on our islands.

For the 2025 poster project, we have commissioned a painting by local nature artist, Patrick Ching, called "Hawai'i's Living Jewels" (please see attached PDFs of this poster's artwork and a sampling of posters from past years). This beautiful artwork highlights many of Hawai'i's lesser-known understory species, focusing on the biodiversity of our native species. Presently, non-native invasive species are a massive threat to our native flora and fauna. We are committed to working to thwart the introduction and spread of these invasives, thereby protecting our native wildlife and habitat. The teaching guide on the back of the poster will highlight these unique native species and the threats they face for survival. There will also be information on how to protect our native eco-systems from invasives and offers suggestions for citizen action.

Our reach for this poster program is every island community statewide. In past years we have worked to raise donations from various agencies and partner organizations to fund this important annual project. Due to rising costs of printing and distribution, and with funding for these agencies and organizations tight, we decided the time had come to seek direct foundation funding to keep this project going. The grant requested from the Lawrence H. Dorcy Hawaiian Foundation would be a substantial contribution towards the completion of the poster project for 2025 and allow us to forego the long slog of approaching numerous organizations for small donations that together would fund the project.

In addition, CCH is working on a pilot project that compliments the poster campaign this year by partnering with 'Ilima Intermediate School to provide an educational outreach program about native Hawaiian species and biodiversity in conjunction with their science teacher and Hawaiian Club. This would entail a field experience to the Freeman Seabird Preserve in Kūpikipiki'o, O'ahu for 10-15 students plus teachers and chaperones from the 'Ilima Intermediate School Hawaiian Club. CCH staff will work closely with Hawai'i Audubon Society to provide a lecture about seabirds and biodiversity, and engage the students with a hands-on activity. CCH will also provide lunch and educational materials, including the "Hawai'i's Living Jewels" poster, to the group.
